



Congressional Structured Settlements Caucus:

Overview: The Congressional Structured Settlements Caucus was established in July 2015, by Congressman John Lewis, D-Georgia and Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner, R-Wisconsin, to help educate Members of Congress on the significant public policy benefits of structured settlements and the economic security structured settlements provide to injured people. As a result of the 2018 Mid-Term elections, a total of 27 Members of the Caucus who were Members of the Caucus lost their re-election bid, ran for higher political office or retired from Congress.
